

The Passing of a Great One

One of the great minds of Caribbean legal scholarship, Professor Emeritus, A. Ralph Carnegie, of the U.W.I. Faculty of Law has passed on.

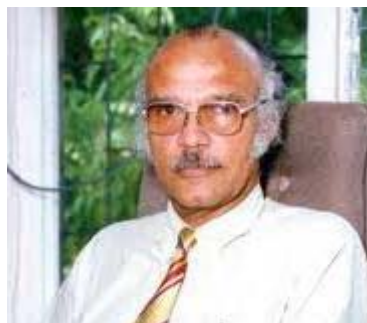
Carnegie was one of the most brilliant minds of a young, legal, academic fraternity in the Caribbean at the U.W.I. He was the morning star of the legal academics in the Caribbean.

Carnegie served on five separate occasions as the Dean of the Faculty of Law, and for six years as the Deputy Principal of the Cave Hill Campus and on several occasions he acted as Principal of the Cave Hill Campus.

The Faculty of Law's Largest Lecture Theatre was named after him in 2007 as a tribute to his brilliant work over a thirty-seven year period. As a Professor of Law, Carnegie's legal work has been published internationally in journals including the British Yearbook of International Law, The Law Quarterly Review, The Caribbean Law Review and the Yearbook of World Affairs.

One of his articles on Judicial Review remains the solid cornerstone of constitutional theory in modern Caribbean law.

Though an Oxford trained Scholar and a genius by every account, Carnegie was ethical, gentle and consistent with his treatment of students. He commanded respect throughout the International Scholarship Community because of the unshakable excellence of his legal work. Very few people knew more about Caribbean Constitutional Law and or Public International Law than Professor Carnegie. His like shall not be seen again in the near future.
